# **Welcome to Taranaki**

It's a small predominantly rural region on the west coast of the North Island that produces one of the highest levels of economic output per person of anywhere in New Zealand.

As a result the people of Taranaki effectively subsidise many of their fellow Kiwis around the country and are proud to do so.

But strangely, despite the high productivity and gross domestic product, the bureaucracy in Wellington which runs the country has little interest in supporting Taranaki, meaning we have to battle to attract an equitable share of government investments and have been falling behind for years.

Specifics are helpful. So here is an example. Over the last seven years Central Government has built 12,000 new social houses across the country. By rights 200 of those houses should have been built in Taranaki to provide us with an equitable share of the nationwide investment.

But, despite a 300% increase in demand for social housing in Taranaki and hundreds of families on the waiting list, the public housing stock in Taranaki has not grown materially.

As of 30 June 2018, the total public housing places in Taranaki was 1271. The most recent data available as of 30 June 2023 indicates 1270 public housing places, reflecting a net decrease of one public housing space.

To be fair, Kāinga Ora has recently opened a new three-story facility in New Plymouth with 48 units but the reality is places smaller than New Plymouth, including Rotorua and Whanganui, have had massive

increases in social housing while the central government bureaucrats based in Taranaki have played down local needs and we simply missed out.

And now our government has decided not to build more social houses through Kāinga Ora.

But it gets worse.

Twenty years ago we had three or four homeless people in New Plymouth and most people knew and supported them.

Now there are more than 100 living on the streets and in cars. So many, a local charity set up a donations-based café in a publicly owned building in town to at least feed them, given they have fallen through the cracks in our welfare system.

Asked to help address the problem of homeless people in town, the bureaucrats determined it would be useful to arrange for the closure of the only homeless shelter in New Plymouth by burying the volunteer organisation in costs and red tape.

These state-employed decisionmakers have made it clear that Central Government does not and will not support shelters for men or for women in Taranaki.

When asked to help, our local senior civil servants provided a comprehensive and impressive list of all the things the public service was not prepared to do to assist rough sleepers.

As a collective, they have indicated that their view is that 'if' there is a problem in our towns with homeless people it is ultimately one where Council would be best placed to lead, somehow conveniently



ignoring the well-known fact that the issues with homelessness in our CBD reflect a combination of welfare, health and housing issues. Welfare, housing and health... all issues where Central Government is supposed to be leading.

But no...the bureaucrats feel that Council should be climbing into expensive social policy issues related to mental health, housing and welfare, while they sit back and provide advice that no money or resources are available from Wellington to try anything new.

Actually, they congratulated Council for committing \$12 million to invest in social housing, because that takes some of the pressure off them for Taranaki's non-delivery in statefunded social housing growth.

And so New Plymouth District Council has made a start to tackle the homelessness problems in town, with an investment of \$120,000 in a pilot programme to help 20-30 of our most vulnerable people.

And we asked Central Government if they would match us with funding, or better yet provide resources to help really make a difference, and reconsider funding of a new shelter and welfare wrap-around service.

No answer. No commitment. No money.

Council is pulling every lever it can in an effort to grow the available

Without centre, without limits 6 July—13 October Govett-Brewster Art Gallery





#### New water pipe for Ōākura

Ōākura's water capacity is being increased thanks to a new two-kilometre water pipe.

The existing pipe is being replaced with a larger one along Wairau Road, which will help the growing town meet its water needs while improving the supply for firefighting.

# Clearing the way for less flooding in Waitara

The removal of pest plants, weeds, litter and overgrown vegetation from a section alongside Waitara's Tangaora Stream will help reduce flooding in eastern Waitara and also enhance the mana of this culturally important stream.

#### **Water meters**

Water conservation is the best thing we can do to ensure the health of our rivers and the environment.

We're working to have water meters for all 26,000 homes in our district by mid-2025 as our district is one of the thirstiest places in Aotearoa.

On average we use 304 litres per person per day, up to 60% more water than places of a similar size and makeup.

# **Your rates 2024/2025**

Like other councils and businesses, our budgets have been hammered by global inflation and we're getting less government help.

Everyone's getting less for their dollar, so we have to spend more on core services like keeping our roads up to scratch.

The average residential rates rise is 11.5% this year – for some it will be less, for others more.

You'll see some changes on the rates bill in the way we all pay for services like water and sewerage.

The Mayor and Councillors agreed the new rates after two rounds of public feedback and a major restructure of the organisation.
